DEC to lift dredging restrictions in Olcott Harbor ahead of construction

The state's environmental restrictions on dredging in Olcott Harbor may be lifted as plans come into focus for construction next year of a long-awaited breakwall to protect the harbor from Lake Ontario's rising waters.

The Department of Environmental Conservation will hold an online public meeting at noon Thursday to present its plans.

Gov. Andrew M. Cuomo announced in February that Olcott Harbor would be dredged in June 2021 as part of a statewide program to deepen 20 locations along the lake and the St. Lawrence River.

Olcott Harbor lies at the mouth of Eighteen Mile Creek. The entire creek, from Lockport to Olcott, was declared a federal Superfund site in 2012.

"It's gotten better over the years," Newfane Supervisor Timothy R. Horanburg said. "The last time we dredged and did all the sediment testing, we didn't find any contaminants above limits."

"We didn't see the heavy metals and PCBs," said Scott Collins of the Niagara County Soil and Water Conservation District. "This outreach event is to let people know that."

The last dredging in the harbor occurred in 2014, and the federal navigation channel also was dredged in 1985 and 1997.

"We're showing everything is much better than it was back in the '80s," Horanburg said.

The removal of the ban would affect only areas north of the bridge that carries Route 18 over the creek at the southern end of the harbor, Horanburg said.

The EPA's planned dredging of creek sediment as part of its Superfund cleanup would occur several miles south of the harbor, a DEC spokesman said.

Thursday's meeting can be accessed through the Eighteen Mile Creek Remedial Action Plan website.

Friday, town officials will meet with the Army Corps of Engineers to pitch a redesigned breakwall project that Horanburg said would be more effective than the one the state approved last October.

Horanburg said testing showed there is no bedrock to support the \$14 million breakwall at its originally planned location, 200 feet north of the ends of the two federal piers at Olcott.

The new plan calls for the piers to be lengthened by about 100 feet, with walls of stone rubble to be built along both sides of both piers. Then, Horanburg said, at least four cells of sheet piling filled with concrete will be lined up in an east-west formation about 500 feet north of the new pier ends.

"We've already modeled it," Horanburg said. "It will absorb waves from all directions."

The east pier, which is 18 inches lower than the west pier, is often swamped by northeast winds that send waves into Olcott Harbor. Horanburg said the rubble walls will block those waves, and the walls also will make a good fish habitat.

The state's October announcement also included a \$1.7 million set of containment walls for the harbor and a \$1.8 million berm to guard the residential area west of the harbor. The berm may be built from sediment dredged from the harbor.

Newfane is paying \$680,000 toward the project, including a \$500,000 state study grant announced in 2018, while Niagara County will chip in \$221,000.

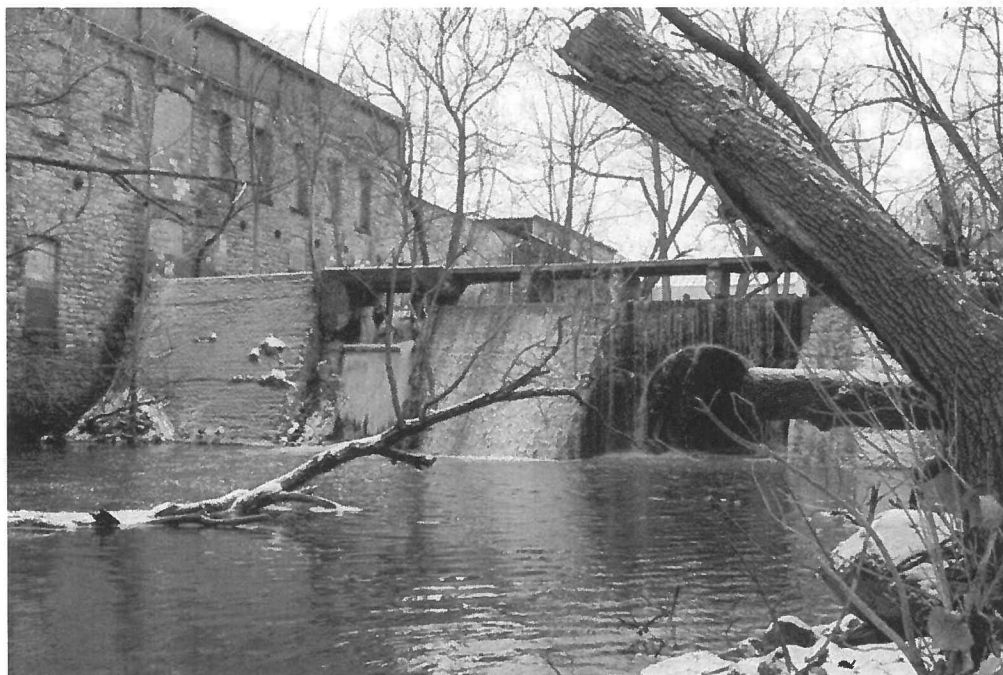

Eighteen Mile Creek dredging ban may be lifted

ENVIRONMENT: State seeks public input on Eighteen Mile Creek management.

Representatives of the state Department of Environmental Conservation and the Niagara County Soil and Water Conservation District will meet with members of the public, albeit virtually, from noon to 1 p.m. Thursday to discuss lifting the longstanding ban on dredging Eighteen Mile Creek.

A Beneficial Use Impairment (BUI) previously placed on Eighteen Mile Creek restricts dredging activities in the creek. The restriction was originally put in place after contaminants including PCBs were documented in creek sediments in the navigation channels below Burt Dam. Possible sources were industrial wastewater discharges and inactive hazardous waste sites noted by the DEC in 1997.

"After a review of recent navigational dredging activities and a thorough assessment of Olcott Harbor sediment quality, DEC and partner agencies have determined that the conditions for (lifting the restriction) have been met. DEC and partner agencies will be seeking public feedback regarding the proposed change in designation," reads a release from the DEC announcing the meeting.

Eighteen Mile Creek presently has five BUIs, including restrictions on eating fish or wildlife, degradation of fish and wildlife populations, bird or animal deformities or reproductive problems and the degradation of benthos (the flora and fauna found at the bottom of a body of water). The restriction on dredging is the first BUI proposed for removal.

“Ultimately, the goal is the removal of all BUIs... and the eventual de-listing of Eighteen Mile Creek as a (Great Lakes) Area of Concern,” said Donald Zelazny, DEC’s Great Lakes Basin programs coordinator.

The Eighteen Mile Creek Corridor, which stretches from Lockport to Olcott, is a registered U.S. Superfund cleanup site. Remediation was planned in four phases by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. The first phase, acquisition of contaminated residential properties and demolition of the long-vacated Flintkote building, both in the area of Water and Mill streets in the city of Lockport, has been completed.

Remaining phases are in progress and include: remediating contaminated industrial properties in the creek corridor, remediating contaminated creek sediment from Lockport to Lake Ontario; and remediating contaminated residential sediment east of the industrial and commercial properties.

Eighteen Mile Creek restrictions explained

At the moment, Collins and his team are working on removing cautionary guidelines around polluted Eighteen Mile Creek, specifically the red flag on dredging in the area beneath Burt Dam and toward Olcott Harbor. Eventually, all five guidelines promoting restrictions will be removed, should the site be judged ready.

"The restriction of fish and wildlife consumption, that's by the Department of Health. ... For the degradation of fish and wildlife population, it's fish community metrics such as diversity, abundance and biomass (that guides when restrictions will be eased)," Collins said.

Collins said his coordination team works with the Remedial Advisory Committee, a group of local community representatives. They decide what the clean-up goals should be. His team also works with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Army Corp of Engineers to determine the criteria for removing restricting guidelines, he said.

"Whenever we update the removal criteria we try to keep it realistic. We have some background reference data so we don't have to reinvestigate everything about it. The bird and animal deformity, the new criteria for that one is that the levels of PCBs are comparable to functional feeding groups. Specifically, American mink are very sensitive to PCBs to where if there's too many PCBs in their diet, they can't reproduce, or (they) develop other deformities," Collins said. "That's our benchmark."

Collins said the restriction on dredging was put in place because of high concentrations of lead and PCBs in the silt at the head of Eighteen Mile Creek.

In 2014, the Town of Newfane applied for and received a permit to do dredging. At the time, it was concluded the contaminants were not at the levels they once were.

"If the Town of Newfane had went out to dredge and found heavy metals and contaminants that would be something to show this impairment has not been restored ... and it (would not have been) safe for them to be able to just go and dredge," Collins said.

With dredging restrictions in place, Collins said, even when a permit is granted, there is likely "extra work" involved for the applicant in handling sediment, including directions on where to put it and how to pull it out. Extra testing might also be required.
