Climate Resilient Farming

The new buzz words for agriculture are "more resilient" and "more sustainable" which in todays high prices and shortages seems like a good plan. For New York State it is also in response to climate change bringing extreme weather shifts from longer droughts to larger rain events and flooding. New York State has made Climate Resilient Farming a priority by budgeting \$17 million dollars in the 2022-2023 budget.

The climate resilient farming grant is broken into 3 tracks. Track I is targeted to fund the covering of Manure Storage Structures and installing a flare to burn off excess methane that would be collected under the cover. The goal of this track is to collect clean water before going into the pit and the farm would save fuel expense in spreading that water with the manure along with less greenhouse gases from spreading the water and burning off the methane. The clean water collected could be held to be used on the farm during a drought and capture water during heavy storm events.

Track 2 is Water Management which is again capturing water during extreme storm events and having water to use during extreme drought events. The reduction of greenhouse gases during these projects will need to be identified, which will certainly make your farm more resilient and sustainable during these times of high fuel costs.

Track 3 is Soil Health which will be improving soil health to make farms more sustainable. This will work using cover crops and changing row crops to permanent pasture or hay crops, even tree planting in riparian buffers or agroforestry. This will make farms more resilient and save fuel costs.

Site Plan and Erosion & Sediment Control Trainings Provided & Planned

NCSWCD provided two hours of Site Plan Training to Code Enforcement Officers and local planning board members. The training, which is approved by the NYS Department of State for Code Enforcement Officers, gives CEO's and local officials an understanding of the requirements for projects falling under the NYS DEC Stormwater Management permits. There is also information on permit requirements and Erosion and Sediment Control Practices required by the permit.

The District continues to provide the 4-hour Erosion and Sediment Control training for contractors and inspectors on NYS DEC permitted sites disturbing more than one (1) acre of soil. The next training is tentatively scheduled for September 8th.

The Niagara County SWCD will be hosting more trainings this fall, please reach out to our office for more information.

NCSWCD Starts New AEM Round

The work on the new Agricultural Environmental Management (AEM) Round has begun! AEM helps landowners fund work from assessing farms and woodland properties for environmental stewardship documentation to developing conservation plans.

Plans help the district and landowners identify funding sources and technical assistance available to address environmental concerns to help protect natural resources. There are many different funding sources through both New York State and the USDA Natural Resource Conservation Service.

The AEM program has provided \$100,000 in cost share program implementation funds. These funds are designated to help landowners already in the AEM program implement cover crop planting, agricultural waste management storage and agricultural chemical storage facilities. These projects will be completed by December 31st of 2023. In 2023-24 NCSWCD will be identifying new farms and projects for the next AEM Round to be completed in 2025. GREEN Projects

Since 2014, NCSWCD has worked with three schools on a project called Global Rivers Environmental Education Network, or GREEN. In the GREEN program students start with a fall field trip around the Eighteenmile Creek watershed to find different issues that impact habitat or water quality within the watershed. Throughout the school year classes discuss solutions to each issue they found and develop a watershed action project.

Projects completed include creating a pollinator habitat on a steep slope, creating an aquatic invasive species bin and building various wildlife nest boxes. Lockport High School started planting a pollinator habitat on a steep slope at the Olcott Marina. This pollinator habitat includes a showy wildflower mix, grasses, clover and milkweed. Newfane High School built an aquatic invasive species bin for boaters and fisherman to use in Olcott. The invasive species bin will be placed near the boat washing station to dispose of aquatic plants that attach to boats or nuisance fish that may be caught (such as gobies). Niagara Orleans Career and Technical Center's Conservation class built and placed various wildlife and pollinator habitat boxes for the Niagara Region State Parks.

Superfund Update

In December 2021, EPA announced the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) would invest \$3.5 billion toward the cleanup of Superfund sites. A portion of that funding will be invested into

cleaning up Operable Units (OUs) 2 and 4. The remainder of 2022 will be used for finishing remedial designs, and construction could begin as early as summer 2023.

Cleanup of these upstream areas could mean great improvements to

Reminder of OU2 and OU4 Sites:

<u>OU2</u> is the creek channel and upland properties surrounding the creek from the Erie Canal to Harwood Street.

<u>OU4</u> includes residential properties east of Mill Street

the Great Lakes Area of Concern. OU2 has been long regarded as the most polluted and a source of PCBs into the water column that get transported downstream. Cleanup of these upstream areas along and completing the remedial investigation of OU3 (from Harwood St. to Lake Ontario) are big strides to restoring the watershed and removal of future beneficial use impairments.

Thank you to all our returning customers and new customers. Hope to see you all next year!


